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
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2020 NACCTFO LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE



Friday, February 28th Morning Session: 8:15 am - 11:00 am

HR: De-escalating Difficult People

Difficult people make for difficult workplaces, and they can exacerbate tensions in an organization. In an interactive session, participants will learn strategies to deal with challenging co-workers and customers, with a focus on identifying the behaviors and de-escalating them.

Afternoon Session: 11:30 am - 3:30 pm Offsite Tour to the Federal Reserve

Session participants will take a tour of the Marriner S. Eccles Federal Reserve Board Building. Immediately following the tour will be a speaker from the Federal Reserve Bank, who will discuss with the group how the Fed approaches monetary policy, with an emphasis on how it impacts county government. Attendees must have a REAL IDcompliant driver's license or <u>alternative</u>, <u>approved photo ID</u>. *To comply with security, attendees are required to submit their full name, date of birth and social security number for U.S. citizens (or passport numbers for non-U.S. citizens) in advance. 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
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2019 OUTSTANDING TREASURER AWARD



Ken Parrish, Kent County Michigan

was recognized as the <u>Outstanding Treasurer Award</u> recipient at the 2019 NACCTFO Annual Conference in Clark County, Nevada. He is a Past President of both NACCTFO and the Michigan Treasurers State Association. He brought the Kent County Treasurer's Office into the technological age by focusing on the automation of manual tasks. He is the only County Treasurer in Michigan to offer a local government investment pool at no cost to the 40 plus municipalities and taxing authorities while enabling them to utilize Kent County's double AAA rating. He and his staff manage the investment fund that is valued at more than \$360 thousand.

A true public servant, Ken has lobbied for pivotal legislative changes for the betterment of his State, serves as a subject matter expert and trainer for the Michigan Treasurers' Association and is a key civic leader in his community and a member of several civics groups in and around his home town. He is well known for founding and chairing the Kent County Land Bank Authority, which according to a study by the Michigan State University's Land Policy Institute determined was responsible for \$47 million in economic development activity over a four-year period.

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The Outstanding County Collector, Treasurer or Finance Officer Award is presented annually to a person who has been an active member of the Association for at least two years and who serves as a leader in their home state and as a professional of the highest caliber in the operation of their own County Office.

This award has been known by a variety of names since its inception. From 1965 to 1968 it was the "Distinguished Service Award" and was bestowed upon a worthy County Collector, Treasurer, or Finance Officer who exemplified characteristics of leadership and professionalism. It became the "Stella H. Spencer Distinguished Service Award," renamed after the 1968 recipient, for the years 1969 thru 1971. In 1972 the award was again renamed in honor of the most recent recipient and became the "Victor E. Martinelli Outstanding Treasurer Award." In 2017, the award became known as the "Outstanding County Collector, Treasurer or Finance Officer Award," reflecting the recipient's official title.

A "Distinguished Panel of Judges" who are not affiliated with NACCTFO nor known to the membership, selects the winner. The award is presented at the NACCTFO Installation Banquet at its Annual Conference each July. The nomination application is limited to no more than 1,000 words and no more than five individual attachment items, including letters of recommendation and/or other recognition forms. Entries that are non-compliant will be returned un-judged.

ARTICLE VIII DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

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LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

President signs spending deal, funding key county priorities in FY 2020

Nearly three months after the start of the federal fiscal year (FY) 2020, Congressional leaders have reached an agreement on two separate spending packages that fund the federal government through the end of the fiscal year on September 30, 2020. President Trump signed the spending agreement, totaling more than 2,300 pages and \$1.37 trillion into law on Friday, December 20, averting a government shutdown and bringing an end to several months of short-term funding extensions and disagreements over spending levels and policy riders.

The FY 2020 spending deal features several significant wins for county governments, including key FPIGA priorities:

• **Permanent and full repeal of the Cadillac Tax:** The spending agreement includes a provision that fully and permanently repeals the 40 percent excise tax, also known as the Cadillac Tax, on employer-sponsored health insurance programs. With counties serving as one of the nation's largest health care providers, the repeal of the Cadillac Tax is critical to ensure counties can continue to provide healthcare coverage for nearly 3.6 million county employees and their families and dependents. **This is a NACo national policy priority for 2020.**

• Additional election security funding: The spending package provides \$425 million distributed through the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) to states for election security improvements including to implement established cybersecurity best practices for election systems." In addition to the \$425 million allocation, the spending agreement also requires a 20-cents-on-the-dollar match by states that receive election security money. This is a major shift from the original five percent match required under the FY 2019 omnibus.

In addition, the legislation directs that states may use this funding to, "replace voting equipment that only records a voter's intent electronically with equipment that utilizes a voter-verified paper record; implement a post-election audit system that provides a high-level of confidence in the accuracy of the final vote tally; upgrade election-related computer systems to address cyber vulnerabilities identified through DHS or similar scans or assessments of existing election systems; facilitate cybersecurity training for the state chief election officials and local election officials; implement established cybersecurity best practices for election systems; and fund other activities that will improve the security of elections for Federal office."

• Election Assistance Commission (EAC): The FY 2020 agreement provides \$15.1 million in base funding for the Election Assistance Commission (EAC), a \$5 million increase over FY 2019 levels. The EAC is an independent, bipartisan commission charged with developing guidance to help jurisdictions meet requirements established under the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) of 2002. The EAC works with counties to coordinate collaborative efforts among local, state and federal government officials in addressing election issues from the accessibility of polling places to the cybersecurity of voting equipment and voter registration databases.

• **Census funding:** With the 2020 Census fast approaching in April 2020, the spending deal provides \$7.6 billion for the U.S. Census Bureau. Of this funding, \$6.69 billion goes towards the deployment of the 2020 census. NACo supports full funding for an accurate and complete count during and throughout the 2020 census to ensure federal support for counties reflects each jurisdiction's full population.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE (continued)

U.S. House passes legislation to repeal SALT deduction cap for two-years; Senate action still needed

On Thursday, December 19, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Restoring Tax Fairness for States and Localities Act (<u>H.R. 5377</u>), which would eliminate the \$10,000 limit on state and local tax (SALT) deductions for 2020 and 2021. Action is still needed in the Senate on this important issue.

Eliminating the \$10,000 cap on SALT deductions would restore local control to our tax systems and improve counties' ability to deliver essential services, such as public safety, emergency preparedness and response, infrastructure, human services, health and more

The SALT deduction allows taxpayers to deduct their mandatory state and local taxes paid from their federally taxable income, protecting individuals and families from double taxation and preserving states' and local governments' decision-making authority. In 2017, Congress passed the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, which capped the amount of SALT deductions taxpayers can take at \$10,000. By capping SALT deductibility, Congress shifted the intergovernmental balance of taxation and limited state and local control of tax systems.
